The people who know me best, - my family, - know that my passion for Rotary is boundless. They also know that I don't expect them to get involved in Rotary the way I have. It's a choice that's up to them. But I must admit. I can't help smiling when I see them making the right choice.

At the end of the Toronto convention last year, my 12-year-old granddaughter turned to me and said, "I'm inspired to do something. What can I do?" Naturally I did what any other Rotarian grandfather worth his salt would do. I asked her if there was an Interact club in her school. When she discovered there wasn't, she attempted to set one up. Unfortunately, her principal had other ideas, but we should not be deterred from helping Rotary youth programs whenever we can, because their value is beyond question.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards are one example. It transforms young people into more confident, focused individuals with a better understanding of the world around them - changes I was pleased to see in my 16-year-old grandson after he participated.

My family is just the beginning. Everywhere I go, I meet people of all ages whose lives have been changed by our youth programs. They tell me how Rotary Youth Exchange taught them a new language or introduced them to a new culture. They talk about how New Generation Service Exchange helped them advance in their career, or about how membership in Rotaract first ignited their passion for giving back to the community

Meeting Report Monday 29th April 2019 - Meeting 2992

Chairman for the Night was PP Colin Bazeley who welcomed Guest Speaker Kay Koch along with a friend - Howard Wittwer.

An overhead advised that up to last weeks meeting the Club had undertaken 3249 hours of work for the Rotary year.

PP Lance Hatcher announced that the Male Voice Choir will sing as part of their performance, the Song of Australia, which was written in Gawler. The performance is on 19th May as an anniversary occasion with a limit of 200 tickets which are available from him.

Stan Roulston as representative of the local Suicide Prevention Group provided detail of a special presentation on May 7th. It reads as follows.

CARPE DIEM ("Seize the Day") Play

The Gawler Suicide Prevention Community Group (in which Stan represents our club) is hosting a play about mental health. Carpe Diem is a contemporary portrayal of Australian males, dealing with issues of health, grief, loss and depression. Set in a fictional town in inland Australia, Carpe Diem portrays the friendship of Nev, a hard-working farmer and John his stock agent friend. Both have been impacted by long running drought with each suffering their own personal crisis. Carpe Diem is a didactic comedy that delivers the mental health messages in a way that is entertaining, immediate and highly relevant. It stresses the importance of mate-ship and professional care in times of crises.

Chris Pidd, actor and general manager at Lifeline Albury, says "This compelling story will help break down the stigma of seeking support early when life gets tough. The play depicts so beautifully how two mates can help each other in times of need."

Carpe Diem will be: appearing at Gawler Institute Hall (i.e. in the Gawler Civic Centre, Murray Street) this Tuesday May 7. Doors open 7pm for a 7.30pm start.

The play will be followed by a Q&A and meet and greet with actors Chris Pidd and David Meadows.

There will be a raffle on the night and free supper.

Produced by Centre Stage Scripts, Carpe Diem is an arts and health initiative for healthier communities.

PP Patsy Johnson called for as many used stamps as possible and she advised that we have been allotted a new Indigenous Health Scholar who will visit us soon.

Jacqui acknowledged the work of several club members, including Barry Stewart for his presentation to soldiers, Stan Roulston for representing the club on the Gawler Suicide Prevention committee, Lance Hatcher, Kathy Heinrich, Trish Williams and Alan Harris for their work on GDSE Committee organising the Swap meet and Male Choir performance, and all volunteers for the Swap Meet on Sunday.

PP Barry Stewart as Sergeant-at-Arms nominated Donations in Kind for the fines, then with several members, entertained the meeting with their stories.

Guest Speaker - Kay Koch "My Career in Real Estate"
